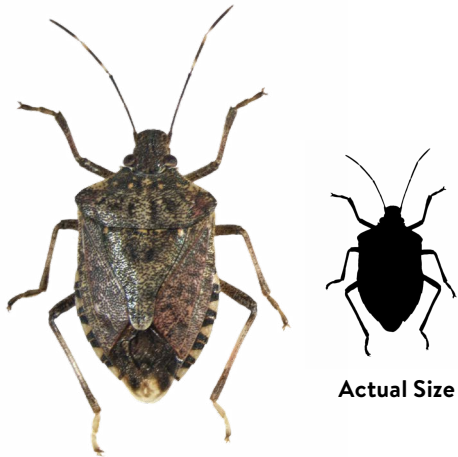


Brown Marmorated Stink Bug and Potential Look-Alikes

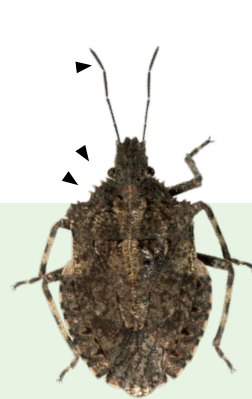


Actual Size

Brown Marmorated Stink Bug

Brown marmorated stink bug (BMSB) is native to Asia, and was accidentally introduced to North America. BMSB is an agricultural pest, feeding on over 300 plant species, including plants found in home gardens and landscapes. Due to its unpleasant odor, large size, and considerable numbers, BMSB can also become a nuisance in homes, especially in fall and winter months.

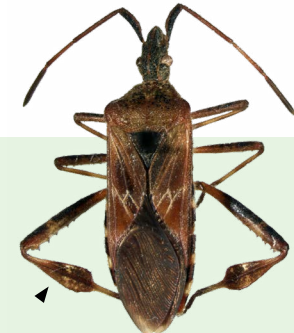
Bugs on this page appear 2.5 times larger than in life.

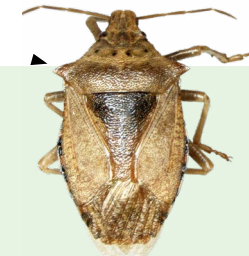

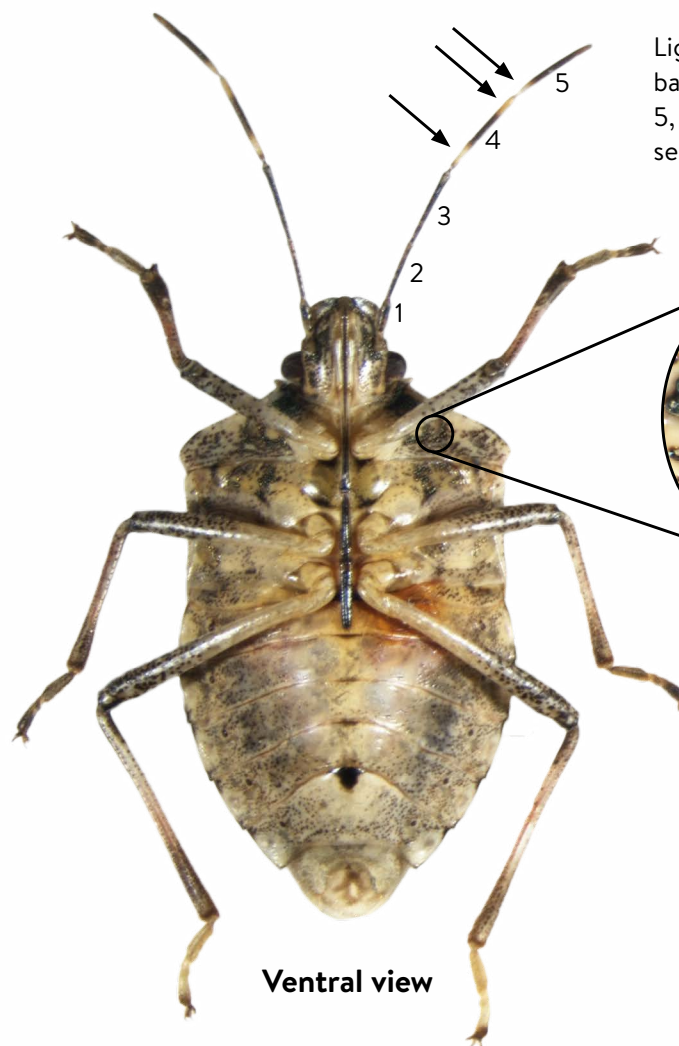
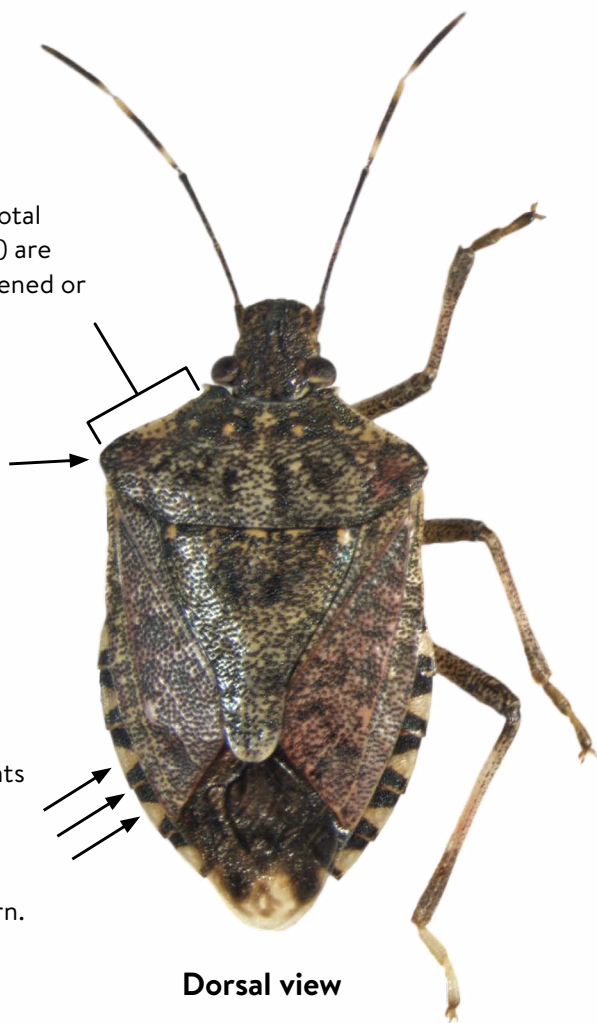
Brown Marmorated Stink Bug Identification

Anterolateral pronotal margins (shoulders) are smooth, not roughened or toothed.

Rounded humeri (shoulder tips).

Abdominal segments protrude from beneath wings, revealing light and dark banded pattern.

Ventral view

Light-colored banding at base of antennal segment 5, and apex and base of segment 4.

Punctures underneath head and thorax are metallic green. These are visible with a microscope or hand lens and a bright light source.
